Construction - What is it?

The construction industry covers the design, construction and maintenance of buildings and infrastructure projects such as bridges, roads, tunnels, waterways, etc.

Construction boasts a wide variety of careers including skilled trades, IT, marketing, project management, design and much more.

Construction needs people with creative, technical, management and practical skills.

Whatever your role is in the industry, if it's as a bricklayer or plasterer, civil engineer, architect or construction manager, every team member is as important as the next. So whatever your talent is, you can be sure there's a career in construction for you.

Choose a career in construction and you won't be starting out on your own. You'll be joining a team of specialist people all working together to build a strong, long-lasting future. Join one of Northern Ireland's largest industries and you'll have chosen a career that's challenging, exciting and rewarding.

What do I need?

There are many ways you can get into construction, and the industry welcomes everyone from newcomers to people with some experience to career changers.

The skills and qualifications needed vary by occupation and range from apprenticeships and NVQs to HNDs, degrees and professional qualifications.

The majority of trades require a minimum NVQ Level 2 or above and professional occupations usually require a degree level qualification or equivalent.

Whether you go to college, learn on site, or go to university you'll obtain specialist training for your chosen career.


Your career in any area in construction will require commitment and enthusiasm.

What are the Opportunities?

Over the next 5 years to 2021, the demand is projected to be strongest in core trades such as roofers, bricklayers and wood trades and interior fit-out. The best prospects on the managerial side are for construction project managers and on the professional side for architects and other construction professionals and technical staff. 17 out of the 28 occupational categories within construction are expected to see growth to 2021.¹

Indicative of an upturn in the construction industry is that the proportion of construction employers facing difficulties finding suitable staff continues to increase (30%, up from just 3% in 2013).²



Current and Future Trends

Northern Ireland is projected to see annual average output growth of 1.6% over the 2017-2021 period. This output growth rate should generate an annual average employment growth of 0.4% over the forecast period leading to an annual average recruitment requirement of 710 from 2017 to 2021, mainly to replace those leaving the sector, due to retirement etc¹.

- Have access to a huge range of training and respected professional qualifications at all levels.
- Have opportunities to progress and/or travel and work throughout the UK, Ireland and/or further afield.

Did you Know?

- 1. Women are under-represented in construction, particularly within the trade occupations.
- There is a GCSE in Construction & the Built Environment and is currently offered in 34 schools across Northern Ireland.
- 3. There are careers in built heritage, sustainable construction and film and television set construction.
- 4. The total value of construction output in Northern Ireland is forecast to be 2.52bn in 2013 prices by 2021.¹
- Construction is projected to have the fifth highest growth of employment in the period 2015-2025 from 20 industry sectors as detailed in the NI Skills Barometer.⁴
- 6. Construction employs around 2.5 million people in the UK that means that one in every ten jobs is in construction.

How I did it...

Ashley McGrath Quantity Surveyor

Ashley McGrath is a Quantity Surveyor currently employed by McCue Crafted Fit.

McCue Crafted Fit are specialists in high quality refurbishment and fitting out and have been established for over 60 years. Company projects include Kaspar's Seafood Bar & Grill within the Savoy Hotel, London, The Shard and Trinity Square. The company also has a marine division which recently completed fit-out works to the Queen Mary 2 cruise ship.

Ashley studied BSc (Hons) Building Surveying at Ulster University and also holds a Post Graduate qualification in Commercial Management. She is involved in many projects within McCue Crafted Fit including, the cruise Ship Queen Victoria, Italy, Danske Bank Donegal Square West, Belfast and Santander, Saltcoates.

Speaking on how she entered into a career in construction
Ashley said, "I was always interested in construction and
engineering by way of influence from my Grandad and one of my
brothers; however I wasn't confident it was an achievable goal
for me, therefore my route into construction was not direct.
It wasn't until I had attained a Triple Distinction in a BTEC
National Diploma in a different discipline that I realised the goal
was within my reach. I was advised that I would be a suitable
candidate for the Building Surveying Degree Programme at
Ulster University. As part of my Degree programme I completed

placements within Northern Ireland Housing Executive and Greater Belfast Development both of which were very insightful and introduced me to the commercial side of the industry which led to my Post Graduate qualification in Commercial Management."

Speaking about her job at McCue Crafted Fit Ashley said, "On a day to day basis my job entails managing all the costs relating to the projects I am working on, including work on and off site, liaising with other construction professionals and the clients such as the Contracts Managers, Site Managers and Architects.

The main aspects of my job includes procurement and payment of sub-contractors, carrying out site measures, valuation of works completed, project cost forecasts, cost variance reports and implementation of change management procedures by way of tracking variations. I really enjoy my job, no two days are the same, each project is unique in its own right and I get the opportunity to travel."
